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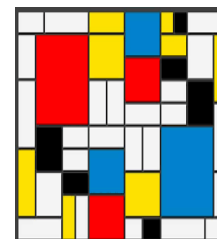
Make a timeline of your day using a visual timetable. Remember to include pictures of each activity from getting up in the morning to bedtime! Talk about the special times in your year: Family birthdays, Christmas, Easter, holidays, moving class... you could make a timeline of the year too.

Parents: Talk to the children about their day. What are special times during the day? Do they like it when they have computer time, making their lunch, playing in the garden or reading a book? Do they enjoy PE with Joe Wicks or Times Table Rockstars?

Art / Computing

PE

Set some time challenges for you and your family. Use a stopwatch/phone/iPad to time how long it takes to do the following ideas, or make some up of your own:

Run up and down the stairs 5 times.

How many goals can you score, bounces on the trampoline or skips can you do in one minute?

Don't forget to stretch to warm up first and take photos if you can to email us!

Science

Ask a grown up to collect some mystery items from around your house made of different materials. No peeking! Ask questions to find out what it could be and what it's made of: Is it cold or warm to touch? Is it flexible? Is it hard or soft? Does it make a ringing sound when tapped? Is it rough or smooth? Can it be squashed, stretched or twisted? Is it shiny or dull? Make some rules up and write these in your book.

Parents: For example: metal is cold to the touch, hard, shiny, makes a ringing sound when tapped. Plastic is less cold to touch, can be flexible or hard and does not make a ringing sound when tapped. Fabric is flexible, does not make a ringing sound when touched and can be soft etc.

Geography

Create a 'bird's eye'/aerial view map of our school. Think about the size and position of the buildings, playgrounds, astro court and field. Use a simple key to colour human features such as the buildings in grey, and green for natural features grass, trees etc.

Parents: Discuss what an aerial view is. Discuss being a bird flying over the school, what would they see? Use Google Maps in map and satellite view to give the children some perspective <https://goo.gl/maps/uDSW5EcV2x3m1NQP>. (Our school postcode SS12 9GJ.)
