With the news that we are moving to a Tier System, we are waiting for updated guidance from the Local Authority. We will continue to follow guidance from Public Health England and Track & Trace.

With Christmas fast approaching I wanted to share with you some of the plans that we have in place for the children and also some changes to some of our Christmas organisation. Christmas Charity—This year we will be supporting a local care home as our Christmas charity.


The care home is Silvanna Court in Wickford .

What parents & carers need to know about ...

The PlayStation 5 is the next-generation video game console from Sony. It offers improved graphics, sound and much quicker loading times. It also has a new controller with motion- and force-feedback features for a more immersive experience. Parents should note that there are two different versions available that support discs or digital downloads.

Safely setting up your Playstation 5



PlayStation 5 Blu-ray

PlayStation 5 Blu-ray is the larger of the two consoles, although not by a lot. It enables you to play games on disc or by digital download. Although all new games are available digitally, the disc drive is still useful to watch movies from discs as well as play most existing PlayStation 4 games you own. It also enables you to purchase second-hand games on a disc which is often purch absence. a disc, which is often much cheaper.




PlayStation 5 Digital

PlayStation 5 Digital is slightly smaller as it doesn't contain a Blu-ray drive. This means the console is cheaper but can only run games you download via an internet connection. Unlike the Xbox Series X and the cheaper Series S, the digital-only PlayStation 5 is just as powerful as its more expensive disc-and-download counterpart.




Family Settings

Both PlayStation 5 models offer important family controls that Both Playstation 5 models offer important tamily controls that should be set up before your family starts using the system. Although this can take a little time, it ensures that children have their own accounts and sets limits on spending, interactions and age ratings. If done correctly, children cannot circumvent these controls that require the parent's password to alter.



You can specify how long, and at which times of day, the console can be used to play without needing a password. Talk to your children and agree how long is appropriate, then set this on their profile, so it's something they understand and accept. You can set different time limits on each of the users on the system.



You can set a limit on spending via Parental Controls. This means that any additional purchase requires your password. Another alternative is not to put credit card details into your account and instead add credit as they need it using the book token-like cards in-store or online. A nice feature on the PlayStation is settling an amount of pocket money to spend on games each month.





The PlayStation 5 uses the same PlayStation app as the Ine Haystation a. In sies the same Playstation app as the Playstation 4. This is a super-easy way to tweak the user settings for your family without having to log on to the console. It's also a good way to keep track of what different people are enjoying on the system. The app can also be used as an easier way to log-on by scanning the QR code.

Creating Guest Account Password



An important step during the PlayStation 5 set-up is specifying the default settings for guest accounts as well as a passcode for your own account. This ensures that all users need to access the system with their own account and related limits and settings.

Managing Online Interactions

Another important area of the Parental Controls is specifying how and who your child can interact with online. Modern consoles enable players to share text, voice, images and video with each other. You can set whether they can do this, and also apply a password before they can add new friends.



Game Subscriptions

In addition to buying individual games digitally or in-store, you can also subscribe to services that offer access to hundreds of games for a monthly fee. PlayStation Plus is needed to play games online with other people and offers a set of games you can immediately download for the new system. PlayStation Now enables you to stream (and download) a wider set of games.



Set up Parent Accounts

Setting up a parents' account is important so you can manage the console for your family. After plugging your console in, connect to the internet and wait for updates to finish. Once updated, create a parent user account with an email address you regularly check and password specified.



Set up Child Accounts

Setting up child accounts are important to be able to limit play time, spending and apply age ratings automatically. Separate accounts for each child user can be set up. It's a good idea to specify a password for the guest account so children cannot access this also.

Spotlight on our Curriculum



In Foundation this week we have been sequencing the story of Six Dinner Sid. In our topic 'Marvellous Me' we have been thinking about what we like, favourite colour etc and sharing this with our friends. We have enjoyed another P.E. session with Zoe from the William De Ferrers sports partnership and working on our gross motor skills.



What an exciting start to our week, we got to use the laptops to practise our dragging and clicking skills. Then in Science we had to put a skeleton back together which was not as easy as you think. In DT we tried a range of fruit and used our evaluation skills and to finish off we made messy maps of our classroom for Geography. Who says we don't work hard in Year 11



In Year 2 this week, we have planned and written our hot task diary entries. In Maths, we have been working on subtraction using number lines and the column method. We have also learnt about early European explorers and the contribution that they made to society. We also talked about how some of the things they did were not so nice. We learnt to play Twinkle, Twinkle on a glockenspiel and we have been practising it in order to perform to an audience. Our Science work has been based on animals and their offspring, and we have made advent wreaths in RE/Art.



In History, we have been learning about the Iron Age and the hillforts they lived in. In PSHE, we have been learning about how to be a good friend. Also, we have started learning to say the names of animals in French. In Maths this week, we have been solving problems using the inverse method. We have also been revising 3D shapes and their properties. We have really enjoyed writing a recount about a Bronze Age Boy's adventure.



This week we have been looking at different word classes that can make our sentences more interesting. We have been looking at perimeters in Maths. In P.E we are beginning to get ready for our Cross Country Virtual Event. We are continuing to look at the Rainforest and the impact humans have on the rainforest.



This week we sorted Liquorice Allsorts in Science (!) to help develop our understanding of classification keys. We learnt about mudskippers in grammar and used this information to add relative clauses into our sentences. In music, we have been using different parts of our bodies to create percussion sounds. Well done to all of the children in 5/6 for working so hard whether at home or school!
