





Superheroes are often characters in a comic. Comic strips tell a story using pictures and speech, usually in the form of speech bubbles. Have you ever read a comic?


Read the attached comic page about The Storymaker. Can you see all the different speech bubbles? Can you draw a superhero and add a speech bubble?

Do you remember what exclamations marks are? They can be used to show someone shouting, saying a command or to show surprise. Did you see any in the comic strip? What about question marks? There are lots being used here. Question marks are used to ask questions. We ask questions when we want to find out information. Did you spot any question marks in the comic strip? Can you add exclamation marks or question marks to your comic strip? Can you write sentences using exclamation marks or question marks?

Parents: Encourage your child to read out their sentences and check for themselves if they have written a statement or question. Maybe look at other books at home and see if they can spot any exclamation marks or question marks.
