-Half-termly Star Tests linked to Accelerated Reader.




### Uniform

## Reading Expectations


- Children must read at home at least three times a week and diaries must be signed by an adult to confirm that they have done so.
- Reading diaries should be brought to school every day and will be checked on Fridays.
- If diaries are not signed for two weeks in a row, they will read during their playtime on that Friday.
- On average, children are expected to read 20 mins per day in order to make progress. Based on quizzes completed, Accelerated Reader calculates an average daily time spent reading.

# Letter-join

We use the letter-join programme to teach handwriting from EYFS to Year 4.

Children are able to access this at home via a desktop or tablet at <a href="https://www.letterjoin.co.uk/log-in.html">https://www.letterjoin.co.uk/log-in.html</a> using the appropriate login.

Children can click on their class name to practice specific handwriting skills related to their year group or 'free play' for a range of skills.



### Homework

- Children should regularly practise times tables on Times Table Rock Stars or other relevant apps as this will aid their basic understanding in all areas of maths. This will support the weekly times table challenge we do every Friday.
- Children will be able to access homework activities for maths, spelling and grammar using Sumdog. Login details will be recorded in reading diaries.

 Communication with teachers should be done via the text system and longer conversations can be arranged for after school.


