



Grammar: Parentheses

• What is parentheses?

Parentheses is a word, phrase or sentence that is put in writing as extra information or an afterthought. If the parentheses is taken away, the passage would still be complete without it.

When to use parentheses?

- Parentheses are when the writer wants to include incidental or extra information. These may be:
- Passing comment
- A minor example or addition
- A brief explanation

Examples of how to use parentheses

- The writer might want to insert parentheses by using commas, dashes or brackets.
- "My friend Chloe (who is three months older than me) is coming to my house tonight."
- "My friend Chloe who is three months older than me is coming to my house tonight."
- "My friend Chloe, who is three months older than me, is coming to my house tonight."
